Description	<p>France has supported the Customs Union reform project since its launching under the French Presidency of the Council of the EU. French custom is heavily involved in several cooperation structures that foreshadow the mandate of the future authority, such as the European Union Customs Alliance for Border (EUCAB). France's bid to host this authority is a continuation of this ongoing support. The aim is to give this authority, whose creation we fully support, the best means to succeed in its ambitious tasks.</p> <p>The Hauts-de-France region is a land of customs tradition at the crossroads of trade between the United Kingdom and the EU, with land, sea, and air borders, and has been able to look to the future by setting up an effective "smart border." The region is also home to the French National Customs School in Tourcoing, whose level of training is internationally recognized.</p> <p>The Lille metropolitan area benefits from a strategic location close to Brussels, the European institutions, and the World Customs Organization. Lille is ready to immediately host the future Customs Authority's operations in the AGORA premises, which are scheduled for delivery in early 2026. It also has a wide range of hotels, enabling it to host major international events and European delegations.</p> <p>Furthermore, the presence of a comprehensive and diverse digital environment, characterized by the presence of numerous companies, universities and trainings in the field of cloud computing and cybersecurity, makes Lille an ideal metropolis to host the European Union Customs Authority, in a context where customs data management is set to become a pillar of European digital sovereignty. The refurbishment work, scheduled to take 12 months, will accompany this increase in capacity.</p> <p>AGORA will provide all the facilities required for the EUCA's future work: meeting rooms of all sizes, including an executive board room, a management board room, eight rooms with 10-15 seats, a 24/7 crisis room, several secure operational rooms</p>	<p>The application proposes to host EUCA in the AGORA building in the centre of Lille, indicating that it will be available from February 2026. It indicates that the proposed premises consist of 8 748 m² of office space and can gradually accommodate EUCA employees: up to 250 by 2034 and 500 thereafter, with a final maximum of 987 people,</p> <p>The application indicates that the proposed premises will provide all facilities required for EUCA. The building also includes relaxation areas and a large secure space for data management, designed for 115 people.</p> <p>A high-security secure room, compliant with French and EU standards, allows for the processing of classified information up to the Top Secret level, with strict access control and anti-intrusion devices.</p> <p>The site has a robust digital infrastructure, certified by WIRED SCORE, offering high availability, telecom redundancy and multiple connections. French operators provide very high-speed fibre solutions and secure clouds, backed by ANSSI (National Agency for Information Systems Security) expertise in setting up a classified network that complies with European requirements. The building can also host its own Information Technology systems thanks to its adapted electrical and spatial capacities. Cybersecurity is based on a comprehensive set of tools (anti-DDoS, WAF, NG firewalls, VPN, encryption, EDR, SIEM) and continuous monitoring by a 24/7 SOC.</p> <p>AGORA offers 54 m³ of archive space, 83 parking spaces, 100 bicycle spaces and 4,000 m² of green space.
