## NOTIFICATIONS BY SLOVENIA OF 7 NOVEMBER 2022, 9 FEBRUARY 2023 and 3 MARCH 2023

## **UNOFFICIAL TRANSLATION**

Article of Directive 2011/83/EU ("CRD")	
Article 9(1a) and Article 16(2)	Slovenia does not make use of these regulatory options.
Article 9.  1a. Member States may adopt rules in accordance with which the withdrawal period of 14 days referred to in paragraph 1 is extended to 30 days for contracts concluded in the context of unsolicited visits by a trader to a consumer's home or excursions organised by a trader with the aim or effect of promoting or selling products to consumers for the purpose of protecting legitimate interests of consumers with regard to aggressive or misleading marketing or selling practices. Such rules shall be proportionate, non-discriminatory and justified on grounds of consumer protection.	
Article 16(2) Member States may derogate from the exceptions from the right of	

withdrawal set out in points (a), (b), (c) and (e) of the first paragraph for contracts concluded in the context of unsolicited visits by a trader to a consumer's home or excursions organised by a trader with the aim or effect of promoting or selling products to consumers for the purpose of protecting the legitimate interests of consumers with regard to aggressive or misleading marketing or selling practices. Such provisions shall be proportionate, non-discriminatory and justified on grounds of consumer protection.

## Article 16(3)

In the case of service contracts which place the consumer under an obligation to pay where the consumer has specifically requested a visit from the trader for the purpose of carrying out repairs, Member States may provide that the consumer loses the right of withdrawal after the service has been fully performed provided that the performance has begun with the consumer's prior express consent.

In the case of service contracts Slovenia does not make use of this regulatory option.
