Re-launch of the centres assisting victims of discrimination. Annual report on discrimination and the Roma population. Should fight prejudices in the media and multiple discriminations.
Funding	Roma inclusion has been supported by national and EU funds. Allocation of 6.7 % (~€ 536 million) of its total ESF budget for integrating disadvantaged people (2007 – 2013).	Should allocate at least 20% of its total ESF budget to fighting social exclusion and poverty. The European Regional Development Fund could be further mobilised to develop housing solutions for Roma.
Priorities for the future (Commission recommendation)	Efforts need to be maintained to ensure the National Roma Integration Strategy The conclusions from the 2013 interna (including strengthening data collection governance) should be followed-up.	evaluation of the Action Plan

4. Promising practices

Integrating Roma into the labour market

ACCEDER Employment Programme

The ACCEDER Employment Programme implemented by the Fundación Secretariado Gitano supports the access of Roma to training and employment via targeted measures. These measures include the combination of guidance, counselling and training activities, with the search for employment in private companies and follow-up process of labour insertion after the beneficiary has started the job.

Since it was launched in 2000, it has had 74 600 beneficiaries, facilitated the inclusion in the labour market of more than 20 000 people, concluded more than 50 800 job contracts. The program received additional financial resources of 10 million EUR in 2012 and 2.1 million in 2013. Therefore, the total budget (ESF, excluding co-funding) of the program for the period 2007-2013 increased from 41 to 53.1 million EUR. In addition and in the framework of ACCEDER, a specific programme has been developed in 17 cities aiming at the labour integration of Roma people of 18-30 years old. It combines theoretical and practical training in a real work environment with a training schedule that allows participants to go through different job positions within the same sector.

'When I grow up I want to be...'

The project 'When I grow up I want to be...' is co-financed by the European Social Fund and is aimed at getting more young Roma (between the ages of 7 and 10) to attend school. A workshop bus with a photographic studio travelled through 38 Spanish cities visiting Roma neighbourhoods, allowing the children to create photomontages reflecting their dream jobs. They then brought this art home with the message, "Whatever your dream may be, finish secondary school". The project has thus far reached 2 800 children and their families.
