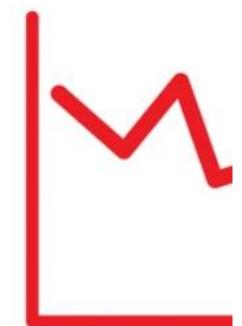
Some universities see figures staying the same

Closure of university language/ TR/INT programmes

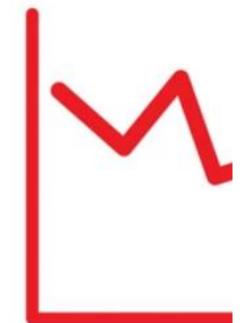

Some countries more affected than others (UK)

Massive rise in language learning via online apps like Duolingo and others

Talent shortage / talent crunch

Only part of the picture

Stickiness

Perception problem

Starts early on

- Lack of role models for the profession
- Adults generally can't/don't/won't distinguish between translating/interpreting
- Changing the name of the profession
- Advances in tech may be shifting how young people understand what translating/interpreting is

Unscientific experiment

Interpreting

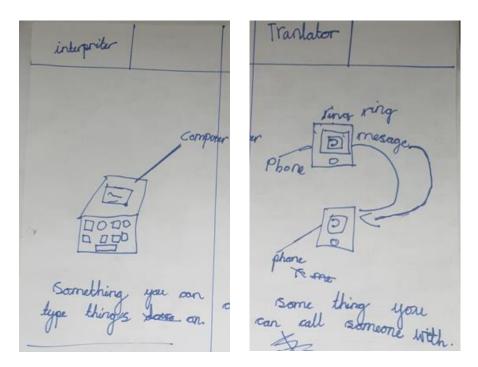
27% of kids have **no idea** what interpreting is

27% think it's something a machine does

19% knew what it was

Remainder were **confused**

(teaches language, just listens, learns languages)



How many of us have encountered the "Oh is that a job?"

"Haven't you been replaced by machines?" narratives

Parents are increasingly saying: Why would you study that?

NOUN | wi-kəd | prä-bləm

a problem that is difficult or impossible to solve because of incomplete, contradictory, and changing requirements that are often difficult to recognize.

LIND expert group / Commission has identified the need for a coordinated campaign to

- talk about these issues
- attract young people to study

A campaign that involves the EU institutions, universities, associations of freelancers and associations of language service companies, and tech companies
