

SUPPORTING COUNTRIES ON THE WESTERN BALKANS ROUTE

Leaders' Meeting WESTERN BALKANS ROUTE

- Leaders' meeting hosted by European Commission to respond to migratory pressure
- EU Civil Protection Mechanism activated by Serbia, Slovenia, Croatia and Greece – receiving material support from other countries such as staff, shelters, transportation and medical equipment
- €21.74 million in EU humanitarian aid delivered to help refugees and migrants in the Western Balkans





People smuggling networks made more than € 4 billion last year, exploiting the million migrants arriving in Greece and Italy







SETTING UP A NEW ASSISTANCE INSTRUMENT FOR EMERGENCY SUPPORT WITHIN THE EU





- Funding of €700 million for 2016 – 2018
- First priority -Greece: €198 million in 2016



- To respond to exceptional crises or disasters within EU Member States, which give rise to severe humanitarian consequences
- To fill a gap in EU instruments for emergency support inside Europe







NEXT STEPS

- Swift operationalisation of the European Border and Coast Guard
- Implementation of the **EU-Turkey Statement** swift and full response to calls for resources by the European Border and Coast Guard and European Asylum Support Office to assist Greece, including:
 - protection of unaccompanied minors
 - acceleration of returns from Greece to Turkey
 - continuing resettlement from Turkey to the EU
- Swift adoption by the co-legislators of the Commission's proposals to reform the **Common European Asylum System**, including the reform of the Dublin mechanism
- Implementation of the new **Migration partnership framework** with Third countries
- Swift adoption by the co-legislators of a new resettlement framework
