


## Period of unprecedented change



## One of most meaningful changes: economic activity of women

The proportion of women in the workforce has increased by a third in the past 50 years and women now account for the majority of undergraduate degrees awarded in the UK

#### Peak of phenomenal growth


- Humanity had mostly functioned in a low growth environment before the 19th century
- This changed after the Industrial Revolution





### We are heading back to lower growth

Not as low as before Industrial Revolution but lower than today



The growth rate of per capita output surpassed 2% from 1950 to 2012. If the convergence process goes on, it will surpass 2.5% from 2012 to 2050, and then will drop below 1.5%. Sources and series: see piketty.pse.ens.fr/capital21c.




#### Some challenges will turn upside-down: demography

- Club of Rome reports in the 1970s warned about overpopulation. Global population has just reached 8 bln…
- However, we are nearing a period of demographic decline
- Fertility rates are falling faster than assumed to below replacement levels

"The great defining event of the twenty-first century will occur in three decades,

give or take, when the global population starts to decline.

Once that decline begins, it will never end."




#### Defining challenge of our generation: climate action

Massive material difference between 1.5 degree Celsius scenario versus 2 degree

(Paris)

That's how fast the Carbon Clock is ticking


The MCC Carbon Clock shows how much CO<sub>2</sub> can be released into the atmosphere to limit global warming to a maximum of 1.5°C and 2°C, respectively. With just one click, you can compare the estimates for both temperature targets and see how much time is left in each scenario.



## Human inventiveness at its best: the renewable revolution


- Capital markets: massive shift in capital allocation towards renewables
- Cost of capital was the same for fossil and renewable projects 10 years ago and widely different today (20% cost of capital for fossil projects, 3-5% for renewable ones)
- Renewable power set to be the largest area of energy investment in 2022





## Three decade long transition

- Slow shifts in consumer attitudes: transparency will need to help
- Global coordination on carbon pricing still to come; current average carbon price only
   6 USD / tone
- Energy tightness as a result of underinvestment in orderly transition
- Innovation likely to surprise on the up-side with frontier technologies playing a key role in the 2030s: fusion, synthetic fuels and direct air capture




## Consensus-building will need to be reinvented

- Polarisation has reached new heights
- We have changed but our institutions much less
- New forms of representative democracy needed
- Permanent citizens' councils and assemblies
- Open legislative bills with citizen input

% who are \_\_ with the way democracy is working in (survey public)





#### Difficult: narcissism of minor differences

Ideological differences much smaller than in the past (50s, 60s)

Freud believed that it is precisely minor differences between people who are otherwise alike each other that lead to feelings of strangeness and hostility.

#### Era of liquid reality

Bauman conceptualised the idea of "liquid modernity" with emphasis on the ever-more rapid change within society


"Forms of modern life may differ in quite a few respects – but what unites them all is precisely their fragility, temporariness, vulnerability and inclination to constant change. To 'be modern' means to modernize - compulsively, obsessively; not so much just 'to be', let alone to keep its identity intact, but forever 'becoming',

avoiding completion, staying underdefined"



#### **Expansion of Internet culture**

- We have moved from oral to written and now to Internet culture
- Older cultures: acuity in reading the world
- The brain has been reprogrammed for us to become good readers
- Internet removes the contemplative side of reading

- Question arises how can collective action be formed on the basis of such diverse experiences




#### What makes us?

Consciousness is about "controlled hallucination"

### Meshing of physical and virtual worlds

- Augmented and extended reality exist already
- Games such as Mindcraft and portals such as Second Life have been antecedents of the Metaverse
- The Metaverse: immersive space that we enter through the internet
- Centred around our identity through avatars
- Disinformation could become even more pronounced in the Metaverse


#### **Back to Aristotle**

Aristotle was king of purpose-driven thinking

 Believed that doing philosophy was the ultimate goal of human existence. For Aristotle, if something did not have a purpose, or telos, it did not exist.

• A human purpose was expressed through our social relations with other people. Politics was what governed these relations and hence a political life had the highest virtue, becoming in fact

an end in itself.





#### Purpose as the organising principle

- The Aristotelian Society in the 1920s: criterion of activism makes society special
- In Latin, socius is an ally or partner while societas is an alliance or partnership
- Purpose of society has to do with the civility with which we solve the most pressing issues of our times







#### Reinvention agenda

- Three aspects stand out:
  - The value system at the heart of the economy
  - Zero-carbon transition and regenerative economy
  - Restoring human-centricity of technological progress
  - "B" stands for benefit social and environmental, as well as financial. If 20th century capitalism was largely about financial returns, then its 21st century version should be about creating social value.



## Courage to be purpose-driven

- Question of purpose is about verifying our assumptions, confirming (or not) what is meaningful to us
- Being purpose-driven is about refusing to accept that "there is no alternative", the belief in historical inevitability
- It also implies taking action, breaking through our individual comfort zones
- Purpose is more about the journey than the final destination
