Introduction

The annual Rule of Law Report lies at the centre of the Annual Rule of Law Cycle, which acts as a preventive tool, deepening multilateral dialogue and joint awareness of rule of law issues. So far, six editions of the Rule of Law Report have been published since 2020.

As every year, the Commission would like to invite the stakeholders to provide contributions to the 2026 Rule of Law Report. On the basis of these contributions and on-going developments, further targeted questions may be shared at a later stage of preparation of the 2026 Rule of Law Report, in particular in the context of country visits, or bilateral contacts.

The Commission invites stakeholders to provide contributions which include:

**(1) developments and measures taken in relation to the recommendations in the 2025 report,
(2) developments related to topics covered in the 2025 country chapters, as well as any other new developments related to the rule of law.**

The input should consist of a short summary, if possible in English, covering the areas referred to below. Legislation or other documents may be referenced with a link. Contributions should focus on significant developments since the last Rule of Law Report both as regards the legal framework and its implementation in practice.

This questionnaire also integrates the separate questionnaire on the single market from last year. In addition to these specific questions, respondents to the questionnaire are invited to consider the Single Market dimension, including any relevant cross-border issues, in all their answers.

Where questions of particular relevance under the single market dimension, this is indicated before the relevant question.

Media Freedom Rapid Response - MFRR's flagship Mapping Media Freedom (MapMF), recorded 1481 press freedom violations affecting 2377 journalists and other media professionals during 2025 across the European Union member states and candidate countries. The rise in the number of alerts in 2024 and small discrepancies with the numbers in 2025 show that this has become a consistent trend. The main difference compared to 2024 lies in the severity of attacks, with 2025 marking four deaths of journalists, compared to one in 2024. Although three of these cases occurred in Ukraine and one in Turkey, they highlight that impunity remains high, as crimes against journalists and murders often remain unsolved for years.

According to MapMF data, government and public officials were responsible for approximately one in five (21%) of all recorded incidents in EU member states during 2025. This marks a sharp increase from 2021, when such officials were implicated in just 10% of incidents. The online environment remains the most common setting for attacks, with incidents steadily rising in recent years. In 2025, 23.5% of all recorded incidents in the EU occurred online, with spoofing, identity disguise, and deepfakes emerging as growing concerns. Intimidation and threats were the most frequent types of attacks, accounting for 19% of cases documented by the MFRR.

Another alarming trend, which surged in 2024 and persisted through 2025, is the proliferation of foreign-agent laws inspired by Russian models. These laws have raised significant concern among media organisations, with repeated threats of adoption and troubling reports emerging across both EU member states and candidate countries. MapMF recorded 72 threats of foreign agent laws in 2025, with a rise of alerts in EU member states - 34 in 2024, escalating from 20 incidents in 2024. This legislation risks silencing and exiling independent media entirely. While Hungary and Slovakia have intensified their push for these laws, similar threats from political figures have been observed in other EU countries. The spread of foreign-agent laws reflects growing illiberal influences in Europe, and the EU must firmly oppose any such proposals.

These types of threats tap into already existing legal threats, such as Strategic Lawsuit Against Public Participation (SLAPP) and criminalisation of defamation, one of the largest and most powerful tools used to intimidate journalists and media outlets. The MFRR submission and the upcoming monitoring report aim to emphasise the importance of timely and robust transposition of the Anti-SLAPP Directive by highlighting concerning cases.

Elections and protests were among the most dangerous environments for journalists in 2025. MFRR has registered 110 election-related alerts throughout the year. In terms of protests, Serbia serves as a stark example, recording the highest number of alerts last year (208), which affected 358 journalists and media workers. In April, the MFRR organised an urgent mission to Serbia to draw attention to the challenges journalists face during protests. The incidents reported there are wide-ranging, including spyware abuse, raids on newsrooms, intimidation, violence, and media capture. While most of these incidents are not directly linked to protest coverage, Serbia's case illustrates how governments are intensifying their crackdown on independent journalism amid nationwide unrest.

Last, but not least, discriminated groups remain most vulnerable to different types of attacks. Recognising that many of them go unregistered due to a distrust in official institutions, it is important to emphasise that they contribute to a general sense of insecurity among independent journalists. Thus, gendered-based attacks remain a concern, with 56 gender-based attacks recorded in 2025, compared to 38 in 2024, and 16 attacks related to the sexual orientation of journalists or media workers. Journalists in exile are particularly vulnerable, and MFRR has started recording cases specifically related to them. With many cases still to map out, MapMF has registered four such cases in 2025.

Ten complaints (see: <https://www.vrt.be/vrtnws/nl/2025/10/06/betoging-flotilla-brussel-politiegeweld-comite-p/>) were filed with Committee P (external monitoring body for the police) after the Flotilla demonstration in Brussels.

According to Mapping Media Freedom, two media freedom violations in 2025 had the police as the source of the attack. Photojournalist Erika Di Benedetto, who works for the OCCRP, was knocked to the ground and her camera was almost damaged. Later that evening, she was attacked again by police in front of the European Parliament when filming a group of police officers beating a woman. shouted at the police to stop (see: <https://www.mapmf.org/alert/33843>). The second case involved freelance journalist Thomas Haulotte who was arrested during the night by the police while covering a disobedience action in the EU district of Brussels. He was administratively detained with handcuffs and spent the night in a cell with five activists before being released (see: <https://www.mapmf.org/alert/33150>).

Politicians from the majority parties N-VA and Les Engagés have submitted a bill to modernise the law of April 11, 1994, on federal government transparency. The law is undergoing a fundamental change whereby transparency is no longer treated as an exception but is recognised as the rule. This is in line with the original intention of the Belgian constitutional legislator. A concrete illustration of this change is that the legislator is abolishing a recently introduced ground for refusal: it can no longer refuse a request for disclosure solely on the grounds that the document contains confidential information about policy strategy. Although the bill does not fully comply with all recommendations from the Flemish journalists' association (VVJ), it comes close. An important innovation is the establishment of a Commission for Access to Administrative Documents, which has binding decision-making power and is equipped with investigative and coercive powers. The proposal builds on last year's legislative amendment and further expands the scope of the federal law on open government. More authorities are covered by the legislation, which significantly increases transparency. The practical accessibility

of the right to public access is also improved. If a request is submitted to the wrong authority, that authority is obliged to forward it to the competent authority. For journalists, processing times may be shorter because an urgent procedure is introduced for situations where urgency can be demonstrated.

Lawsuits (incl. SLAPPs - strategic lawsuits against public participation) and convictions against journalists (incl. defamation cases) and measures taken to safeguard against manifestly unfounded and abusive lawsuits

Belgium is actively working to transpose the European Anti-SLAPP Directive (strategic lawsuits against public participation) via a draft bill approved at first reading at the end of 2025 by the Council of Ministers, aimed at protecting journalists, advocates and citizens against abusive lawsuits intended to silence them. Full entry into force is expected by May 2026.

The Flemish journalists' association (VVJ) welcomed the fact that the protection applies in both cross-border and purely national legal proceedings. However, the safeguards only apply to civil cases, excluding tax cases, customs cases, administrative cases, and state liability for acts in the exercise of public authority. Arbitration and criminal cases are also excluded.

Defamation and libel are not being removed from criminal law, but prison sentences as a sanction are being abolished in the new Criminal Code.

Cases:

Belgian journalist Dirk Selis was eventually acquitted by the Court of Appeal in Antwerp in the case concerning the early vaccination of former mayor Veerle Heeren (CD&V). The court ruled that Selis acted with a legitimate journalistic purpose and that his methods were proportionate and necessary for the provision of information. This ruling sets an important precedent for press freedom and the relationship between journalism and data protection. Selis had previously been sentenced by the Hasselt Criminal Court to a suspended fine of €2,000 for unlawful processing of personal data.

On 4 December 2025, Belgian investigative media Médor denounced a "gagging procedure" following a six-year legal battle over an investigative report - the case was eventually dismissed on 30 April 2025. The defamation lawsuit was initially filed by Socfin, a palm oil and rubber conglomerate owned by the billionaire Hubert Fabri, based in Luxembourg and the French Bolloré Group, before the penal court in Luxembourg on 6 June 2019. The lawsuit stemmed from an investigation published by Médor on 6 March 2019, in which the journalist Cédric Vallet detailed a "contentious concession" obtained by Hubert Fabri and the Bolloré Group on forest land occupied by the indigenous minority (the Bunongs) in Cambodia's Mondulakiri region. The investigation precisely revealed that the concession was used to plant rubber trees and was allegedly "over which suspicions of corruption hang." Socfin's complaint primarily focused on allegations of corruption, "land grabbing," and the notion of "land conflict," which Médor noted had been proven and documented since 2009. The party leader Georges-Louis Bouchez (MR) has stepped up his verbal attacks on journalists and media outlets. On 14 October 2025, he described the French-speaking public broadcaster RTBF "the official supplier

of left-wing fake news” in a message on social media in response to RTBF’s coverage of a trade union demonstration.

The General Association of Professional Journalists in Belgium (AVBB) condemned these statements as unfounded attacks that only contribute to a climate of mistrust and hatred towards news professionals.

On another note, recently, the Flemish journalists’ association (VVJ) received several requests from freelance journalists to shield their business address in the Crossroads Bank. The requests were motivated by a professionally foreseeable threat to their person, property, and possessions.

The problem of online and offline aggression against journalists is substantial and growing. Our five-yearly journalist survey, conducted in collaboration with Ghent University, UMONS, and ULB, shows that no less than 55 percent of the profession has experienced aggression. This percentage can hardly be underestimated and emphasises the urgency of adequate protective measures. These specific requests raise an important question about the possibilities for better protecting journalists against threats arising from their professional activities. The current situation calls for a thorough reflection on how journalists in Belgium who are confronted with foreseeable threats can also be adequately protected without jeopardising their professional activities. The VVJ has brought the issue to the attention of politicians.
