Funding	Roma inclusion supported by national and EU funds.  In the 2007-2013 financial period, Sweden has allocated 3.4 % (~ €23 million) of its total European Social Fund (ESF) budget for integrating disadvantaged people.	As of now, Sweden should allocate at least 20% of its total ESF budget to fighting social exclusion and poverty.
Priorities for the future (Com- mission recommendation)	A constructive dialogue with civil society and close cooperation with local and regional authorities needs to be reinforced.  The impact of measures and activities taken to support Roma inclusion should be further monitored.

### 4. Promising practices

#### Offering tuition and business skills

The Adult Education Association in Gothenburg (Studieförbundet Vuxenskolan i Göteborg) offers tuition for Roma who have not completed primary or secondary school education. The city of Gothenburg also launched a programme offering Roma 12-week courses in entrepreneurship and the practical skills to develop their own business ideas. Led by the East Gothenburg authority, the 'New Way' project co-funded by the European Social Fund helps Roma people integrate better into the Swedish workforce. Business-aware cultural interpreters are on hand and expert instructors offer modules on marketing, taxation and finance. The project aims to find new ways into work, including self-employment, education or as an employee
