#### INTRODUCTION

DG JUST's mission is to uphold and strengthen the rights of people living in the European Union, whether they are acting as citizens, as entrepreneurs, as consumers or as workers, wherever they are in the European Union. To achieve this, DG JUST aims to strengthen the respect of the core EU values – democracy, fundamental rights, equality and the rule of law, to deepen European cooperation in the area of justice, and to support the development of a dynamic single market for consumers, workers and businesses, contributing to European growth. DG JUST manages a substantial set of EU laws in its competence areas. To achieve EU objectives in these areas, DG JUST uses a wide range of tools, like targeted legislative actions, non-legislative actions and enforcement tools aimed at ensuring effective application of EU laws. The Justice programme, the Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values programme, and part of the Single Market programme provide substantial financial support to the DG's overall policies.



This management plan presents the main actions of DG JUST in 2022, which will contribute to the achievement of the European Commission priorities. DG JUST contributes in particular to four headline ambitions defined by President von der Leyen in her political guidelines for the 2020-2024 mandate: A new push for European democracy, A European Green Deal, A Europe fit for the digital age and Promoting our European way of life. The DG also contributes to achievement of the headline ambition An economy that works for people, with a new initiative on harmonising certain aspects of substantive law on insolvency proceedings and its efforts on improving the framework for board members in credit institutions.

President von der Leyen's State of the Union speech<sup>1</sup> and the 2022 Commission Work Programme<sup>2</sup> put an emphasis on the EU policies in justice and equality area, focusing on the rule of law and equality. In 2022, DG JUST will contribute to delivering the recovery

## General objective:

## A new push for European democracy



## Specific objective 1. **Strengthened rule of law in the Union**

The rule of law is one of the fundamental values upon which the European Union is based and it is indispensable for the application of EU law and for sustainable and fair growth. It is also a prerequisite for the effective functioning of the EU, based on mutual trust. The Political Guidelines of President von der Leyen<sup>3</sup> set a roadmap for a comprehensive European Rule of Law Mechanism, with an EU-wide scope and objective annual reporting by the European Commission.

As part of the Rule of Law Mechanism, in 2022 the Commission will publish the third Annual Rule of Law Report, a preventive tool for early detection of challenges and for finding solutions. For the first time, the Report will come with specific recommendations to Member States, as announced in President von der Leyen's State of the Union Speech of 15 September 2021. DG JUST will continue providing support for the Commission's application of the Rule of Law Toolbox, which now includes the general budget conditionality, the Recovery and Resilience Facility and the European Semester, as well as infringement proceedings where required. DG JUST will also support the Council in conducting the two Article 7 TEU procedures, currently pending. Work on infringement procedures that were successfully launched will continue. DG JUST will also prepare the 2022 EU Justice Scoreboard, which provides a comparative overview of the efficiency, quality and independence of national justice systems.

## Specific objective 2: Strengthened application of fundamental rights

A strong protection of people's fundamental rights goes hand in hand with a healthy democracy where the rule of law prevails.

In 2022 DG JUST will continue to ensure that the Commission fully applies the Charter of Fundamental Rights in all its actions. DG JUST will in particular present its **annual report** on the application of the Charter in the EU.

Combating hate speech and hate crime is part of the Commission's action to foster the EU values and to ensure full respect of the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights. DG JUST will support negotiations in the Council and the European Parliament on the Commission initiative to **include hate speech and hate crime in the list of EU crimes** in Article 83(1) TFEU. DG JUST will also seek to reinforce the **Code of conduct on countering illegal hate speech online** in the context of the policy work undertaken in the High Level Group on Racism and Xenophobia.

DG JUST will coordinate the implementation of the EU strategy on the rights of the child adopted in March 2021. In 2022, the main deliverables will be the establishment of **the EU Children's Participation Platform** to foster the participation of children across the EU to political and democratic life, and the launch of the **EU Child Rights Network** to reinforce the dialogue among Member States, relevant stakeholders and the EU institutions.

The EU Strategy on **combating antisemitism and fostering Jewish life**, adopted in October 2021, steps up action to actively prevent and combat antisemitism in all its forms. In 2022, DG JUST will work to bring together representatives from the Commission, the Member States, and relevant stakeholders to address antisemitism and maximise the effect of joint actions and EU funding. DG JUST will also continue coordinating the work on combating **anti-Muslim hatred and discrimination**.

## Specific objective 3: **Improved framework to protect democracy in the European Union**

Democracy is at the centre of EU values and key for a strong protection of fundamental rights. In the area of democracy and electoral rights, DG JUST will deliver on a number of commitments from the European Democracy Action Plan and the Citizenship Report 2020. A new joint mechanism will become operational, building on the work of the European Cooperation Network on Elections, with the aim to **promote resilient electoral processes** and take further practical measures to **protect election infrastructure against threats**, including on cybersecurity, disinformation and online forensics. DG JUST will work on a compendium on e-voting and best practice of voting rights of people with disabilities

With a view to the next elections to the European Parliament, DG JUST will work with the European Parliament and the Council to move toward adoption of its proposals on transparency and targeting of political advertising, as well as on two directives on electoral rights of mobile EU citizens in elections to the European Parliament and municipal elections.

As part of an **EU action against abusive litigation (SLAPP)** targeting journalists and rights defenders, one of the actions under the European Democracy Action Plan, DG JUST will put forward a proposal for an initiative in 2022. The initiative aims to provide civil procedural safeguards for cross-border situations and to recommend best practices also to national level as well as European supporting measures.

The topic of democracy and citizens' rights feature prominently in the Conference on the Future of Europe, which should deliver its results in 2022. DG JUST will play an important part in providing its expertise, assessment of proposals and follow up on the Conference's outcomes.

## Specific objective 4. Increased perception of the status and the rights conferred by European citizenship

The Covid crisis demonstrated the need to protect EU citizens in Europe and abroad in particular in times of crisis and emergency. In 2022 DG JUST will continue to work on ensuring that restrictions to free movement introduced to protect public health during the COVID-19 pandemic are strictly necessary, proportionate and non-discriminatory. DG JUST will continue to ensure a coordinated approach to restrictions of free movement during the pandemic and present amendments to the respective Council Recommendation where the epidemiological situation so requires. DG JUST will present a proposal to extend the period of application of the EU Digital Covid Certificate Regulation<sup>5</sup> beyond the initial limitation of June 2022 and present a report on its application in March 2022. DG JUST will contribute to the single market emergency instrument, which will allow the EU to be better prepared for future crises, not only linked to public health. The lessons learned from the pandemic will be included in updated guidelines on the implementation of the Free Movement Directive, which serve to provide for more clarity on free movement rights. They will take into account the most important judgments and address in particular rights of cross-border rainbow families. Finally, DG JUST will continue to monitor the correct implementation of the citizens' rights part of the Withdrawal Agreement concluded with the United Kingdom and take appropriate measure to ensure its effective implementation.

In 2022, DG JUST will deliver on its commitment to propose new rules on **consular protection**. The new rules will aim to enhance cooperation among Member States and strengthen the EU's supporting role, resulting in better consular protection to EU citizens travelling to third countries. An impact assessment will be carried out for this initiative.

## Specific objective 5. **High level of personal data protection achieved throughout the EU and EU data protection promoted as a global model**

The right to the protection of personal data is a fundamental right enshrined in the EU Charter of Fundamental Rights. It is also a key element in delivering the "European way for the digital society" which is human-centred, ensures full respect of EU fundamental rights and further enables people to enforce their rights.

DG JUST will continue assessing – and enforcing where necessary – the **compliance of national legislation with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)** and the **Data Protection Law Enforcement Directive (LED)**, and mainstreaming data protection rules into key EU sectoral policies, such as Data Strategy initiatives including common European data spaces, health, financial services and law enforcement. Compliance assessments of national data protection laws will also be conducted in the context annual Schengen evaluations.

As a follow-up to the 2020 GDPR evaluation report, DG JUST will pursue regular exchanges with national authorities and stakeholders, including through the Member States' expert group on GDPR and LED, the Multistakeholder expert group on GDPR and the network of police data protection officers (DPOs). It will continue contributing actively to the work of the European Data Protection Board (EDPB), in particular when it is preparing guidelines aimed at stakeholders, and will support national data protection authorities through EU grants to reach out to individuals and SMEs in particular.

DG JUST will prepare the first Commission report on the application of Data Protection Law Enforcement Directive and the first Commission report on the application of the Regulation on Data Protection for EU Institutions and Bodies (EUDPR), the "GDPR" for EU institutions and bodies.

The GDPR has become the "gold standard" and continues to be emulated by many countries that have aligned, or are aligning, their data protection framework (for example, Brazil, Chile, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Paraguay, India, Indonesia, Japan, South Korea etc). **Negotiations on transatlantic data privacy flows** with the United States have intensified to comply with the July 2020 judgment of the Court of Justice in the Schrems II case. DG JUST will continue working with international partners towards upward convergence of data protection rules as a means to facilitate data transfers while ensuring the protection of personal data transferred abroad.

DG JUST will finalise its work on a Commission proposal for a framework agreement on cross-border cooperation of supervisory authorities.

With respect to specific instruments for data transfers from the EU, DG JUST is finalising **the review of the 11 adequacy decisions** adopted under Directive 95/46 and the adequacy decision for Japan (the first such decision adopted under the GDPR). In line with

the GDPR evaluation report of 2020, DG JUST will intensify its dialogue with third countries – as well as international organisations such as the OECD – interested in an adequacy finding.

Given the increasing importance of data exchanges as part of cross-border cooperation in criminal law enforcement, DG JUST (together with HOME for Europol) will work on negotiating cooperation agreements ensuring appropriate data protection safeguards on behalf of Eurojust and Europol, based on the mandates received from the Council. This also includes the renegotiation of existing Europol agreements as well as the existing Mutual Legal Assistance Treaty with Japan with a view to add the necessary safeguards. The Commission report on the evaluation of the Law Enforcement Directive that will also cover international data transfers.

## Specific objective 6. **Eliminate inequalities and discrimination, and promote equality** for all

To further build a "Union of equality", DG JUST will implement a wide range of activities to combat discrimination and promote equality. The Commission will continue to closely monitor the correct application of anti-discrimination legislation and it will support the Council towards the adoption of the Equal Treatment Directive, to ensure that discrimination on the grounds of religion or belief, age, disability and sexual orientation is prohibited in the same way as it is on grounds of sex and race or ethnic origin. The Commission will also continue to provide support to Member States to step up national policies and legislation on combatting discrimination on all grounds through the work of the High Level Group on Non-Discrimination, Equality and Diversity and it will continue to work with the Member States to improve the collection of equality data and to support the Diversity Charters.

To implement the EU Anti-Racism Action Plan<sup>6</sup>, the Commission will put forward a proposal for new legislation on minimum Standards for Equality bodies and prepare a study on possible gaps in the legal protection against discrimination on grounds of racial or ethnic origin. A public consultation has been launched to prepare the initiative on equality bodies. In March 2022 DG JUST will organise a second EU Anti-racism summit and in April 2022, the Commission will nominate the first winners of the Capitals for diversity and inclusion award, ahead of the EU Diversity Month.

The Commission Anti-Racism Coordinator will continue to work closely with the subgroup composed of Member States experts towards the adoption of the **national action plans against racism** based on EU guidelines, and will ensure a dialogue with civil society organisations and other stakeholders.

As part of the implementation of the reformed EU Roma strategic framework, which sets a number of targets up until 2030 aiming to promote effective equality, socio-economic inclusion and meaningful participation of Roma, the Commission will adopt a Communication on the assessment of the national Roma strategic frameworks and will implement a Preparatory Action of Roma civil society capacity-building and reporting. To promote effective equality, socio-economic inclusion and meaningful participation of Roma<sup>7</sup>, the Commission will continue to work closely with the Member States to facilitate the implementation of their national Roma strategic frameworks.

To further implement the LGBTIQ Equality strategy<sup>8</sup>, the Commission will issue **Guidelines on national LGBTIQ equality action plans** to support the Member States' efforts. The Commission will also continue a regular dialogue with the civil society organisations and support diverse projects under the CERV programme.

DG JUST will continue to implement the actions set out in the **Gender Equality** Strategy<sup>9</sup> 2020 – 2025 and work on gender mainstreaming in EU policies, legislation and budgets. DG JUST will report on the second year of the Strategy's implemention.

DG JUST will in particular put forward a **Council Recommendation on revising the Barcelona targets on childcare**. This initiative will form part of the European Care Strategy, together with a proposal on long term care, which falls under the responsability of DG EMPL, and will also contribute to "Promoting our Europen Way of Life" headline ambition.

DG JUST will continue to lead the inter-institutional negotiations of the proposal on **binding** pay transparency measures, which was put forward in March 2021, striving for a swift adoption while maintaining the proposal's ambition. DG JUST will also work towards relaunching the Council's discussion on the initiative on Gender Balance in Corporate Boards.

DG JUST will present a **legislative proposal on violence against women and domestic violence**. Following the adoption of a draft directive scheduled for March 2022, the Commision will support the co-legislators towards a swift adoption of the act to ensure that EU Member States have effective measures in place to prevent and combat such violence. DG JUST will also prepare a **Council Recommendation on harmful practices** which will complement the legislative proposal.

Finalising the **EU's accession to the Istanbul Convention** also remains a priority for the Commission. Following the Court of Justice's opinion issued in October 2021, DG JUST will work with the respective Presidencies to **relaunch the accession negotiations** in the Council.

Finally, in line with its equality mainstreaming work plan, DG JUST will promote and apply **equality mainstreaming in initiatives** which are not equality-specific, such as initiatives in the areas of justice and consumers.

Specific objective: Improved sustainable consumption by empowering consumers and improved integration of sustainability considerations into companies' and companies' behaviour through an upgraded corporate governance framework

DG JUST will finalise the preparation of the **legislative proposal to empower consumers for the green transition** to be adopted in Q1 2022. The proposal aims to improve the information at the point of sale about products' environmental characteristics, such as lifespan and reparability. It also aims to better protect consumers from certain practices, such as greenwashing, product obsolescence or unreliable sustainability labels and digital information tools.

National consumer authorities will use existing legislation on unfair commercial practices to increase their number of relevant coordinated activities targeting unfair green claims and obsolescence practices.

DG JUST will put forward in 2022 a **new initiative promoting a more sustainable use of goods throughout their useful life by amending the Sale of Goods Directive and introducing a new right to repair** (planned for adoption in Q3, 2022). The initiative will aim to encourage consumers to make more sustainable choices by providing incentives and tools to use goods for a longer time, including by repairing defective goods. It will also encourage producers to design goods that last longer and are easily reparable. This would reduce unsustainable consumption and its negative impact on the global environment and climate and contribute to building a circular economy. An impact assessment will be carried out for this initiative.

DG JUST launched the pilot phase of the **Green Consumption Pledge** in 2021. It is an initiative to undertake concrete, public and verifiable commitments by business operators that go beyond legal obligations with an objective to promote the green economy. Eleven companies have come forward with strong commitments on e.g. CO2 emission reduction and engaging their consumers in sustainable practices. In 2022, following up on the lessons learnt, DG JUST will present the revamped design of the pledge for a roll-out.

In the context of company law, DG JUST will propose, jointly with DG GROW, legislation fostering more **sustainable corporate governance** in companies in Q1 2022, and subsequently support the negotiations of the co-legislators on this file. This work contributes to implementing the overall Commission's objective of a just transition to a sustainable economy and a sustainable recovery after the Covid crisis, and was announced in the European Green Deal and the Commission's Recovery Plan. The aim is to foster long-term sustainable and responsible corporate behaviour in the green transition and beyond, contributing also to the headline ambition of "an Economy that works for people". The focus

of the initiative will be on putting forward EU-wide rules on corporate due diligence, to mitigate or prevent adverse impacts in the company's own operations and its value chains. Work will also continue on the **transposition control of the revised Shareholders Rights Directive (SHRD 2)**, fostering long-term shareholder engagement, which was to be fully transposed by 2020.

Under the headline "an Economy that works for people", DG JUST's work on **improving the regulatory and corporate governance framework for board members in credit institutions** will continue in 2022. DG JUST will support the interinstitutional negotiations of the **banking package** adopted on 27 October 2021, jointly with DG FISMA. DG JUST's contribution includes a review of the rules and procedures ensuring that board members have all the qualities and skills to manage the banks in a prudent and sound manner. In addition, focus will be on conducting transposition checks on the **Capital Requirements Directive V** and the **Investment firms' Directive**.

### General objective:

## A Europe fit for the digital age



#### Specific objective 1: **Consumers are empowered and better protected**

In 2022, DG JUST will finalise a proposal to **revise the Distance Marketing of Financial Services Directive** to better protect consumers in the digital environment, to ensure a level playing field and reduce unnecessary burden for financial service providers. Following the digital transformation of the retail financial services sector, and taking into account the development of product-specific legislation (e.g. in relation to the banking sector, consumer credit, mortgages, insurance, personal pension, investment products or payment services) or horizontal legislation, the proposal will aim to ensure a future-proof and streamlined framework for the distance marketing of financial services. This initiative will be accompanied by an impact assessment.

DG JUST will continue to actively participate in the ongoing negotiations by the European Parliament and the Council on the legislative proposal for a new **Directive on Consumer Credit**. The proposal was adopted by the Commission in June 2021. The co-legislators are expected to reach an agreement in the course of 2022.

In 2022, DG JUST will also continue to actively assist the two co-legislators in their negotiations on the Commission's proposal for a new **General Product Safety Regulation**, adopted in June 2021. The final agreement by co-legislators could be reached by the end of 2022.

DG JUST will continue its work to help EU consumers affected by or at risk of **overindebtedness** with two initiatives launched in 2021, namely the financial support to centres for debt advice to consumers and a study. The study will identify the most affected

categories of consumers, analyse the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, and EU and national rules and their possible role to prevent or remedy overindebtedness.

In 2022, DG JUST will intensify its work on ensuring digital fairness for consumers. In particular, DG JUST will finalise a behavioural study that gathers evidence on the prevalence and effects of new unfair practices in the digital environment, so-called 'dark patterns'.

The Commission will continue **defending the rights of package travellers** in a fast-changing, highly digitalised market. During the COVID crisis, many package holidays were cancelled and travellers did not get their money back or only with considerable delay due to liquidity issues of organisers. As indicated in the 2022 Commission Work Programme<sup>10</sup>, DG JUST will evaluate whether the **Package Travel Directive** ensures robust and comprehensive consumer protection at all times, including during major disruptions like the COVID-19 pandemic. The evaluation will will be carried out back-to-back with an impact assessment and take into account relevant actions of the sustainable and smart mobility strategy and also examine the possibility to simplify or streamline the rules of the current regulatory framework. In light of the outcome of this back-to-back evaluation and impact assessment, the Commission may propose a revision of the Directive at the end of 2022.

In addition, DG JUST will continue to assist Member States in the **transposition of the Directive on representative actions** for the protection of the collective interests of consumers. It will also develop a collaboration tool that will support the good functioning of the representative actions.

In 2022, DG JUST will start a review of the functioning of the alternative and online dispute resolution (ADR/ODR) legislation and of the consumer protection cooperation (CPC) Regulation, notably thanks to evaluation studies. This is needed to ensure that they are still fit in relation to the rapid development of online markets, their internationalisation and to increase the resilience of these frameworks using lessons learned from the COVID crisis. Coordinated enforcement activities to address EU level breaches of consumer law will be intensified with a view to address all major issues, notably in online and travel markets. Capacities of CPC authorities will be further strengthened through training, grants and the provision of online enforcement common tools (the E-Lab). A report on the biennial priorities of the CPC network will be published and new enforcement and capacity indicators will be prepared.

In 2022, DG JUST will continue to solidify the collaboration with its **consumer policy stakeholders**, notably through the Consumer Policy Network with national ministries, the Consumer Policy Advisory Group with consumer organisations, businesses and experts, and through the subgroup of the Consumer Policy Advisory Group, with national consumer organisations. DG JUST will perform a scoping study on **consumer education**. A new

## Specific objective 2. A human-centric legal framework for Artificial intelligence that protects citizens and promotes cross-border trade

Following the adoption of two Commission Proposals for Regulations laying down harmonised rules on Artificial Intelligence (AI)<sup>11</sup> and on General Product Safety<sup>12</sup>, DG JUST will continue to implement the Commission's strategy concerning AI in two main work strands:

- (i) It is the primary responsibility of manufacturers to ensure their products have been fully assessed for all their possible functionalities. To this end, DG JUST is working on a **revision of the General Product Safety Directive**, which is currently in the legislative process;
- (ii) DG JUST will work in parallel on a proposal for harmonised liability rules for AI in order to create legal certainty, avoid fragmentation in the EU and build an adapted framework, which ensures that victims of damage caused by AI-equipped products/services have the same level of protection as victims of traditional technologies.

Specific objective 3. Company law improves conditions for companies, including SMEs, in particular to operate and expand cross-border and to use digital tools

Contributing to creating a legal framework enabling companies, and importantly SMEs, to thrive and expand within the Single Market, while providing protection for the stakeholders concerned, DG JUST will work in 2022 on preparing a proposal for a legislative initiative on upgrading digital company law. This initiative will be the second step of the digitalisation of company law, following the 2019 Digitalisation Directive. The COVID-19 pandemic has proven how essential digital tools and processes in EU company law are to ensure business continuity. In the new initiative, DG JUST will continue to focus on upgrading company law to keep up with the ongoing developments in digitalisation and technology. The initiative would address the issues of transparency and access to company information, in particular via the Business Registers Interconnection System (BRIS), use of authentic and trustworthy company data cross-border, and ways to make the EU company law rules and procedures fit for digital age.

In the framework of its overall task to lead the work on **the maintenance and development of the Business Registers Interconnection System (BRIS),** in 2022 DG JUST will focus on adapting the system to the new company law rules set by the Digitalisation Directive and continue to enforce the transposition of the existing rules. DG JUST will also prepare a BRIS implementation report that will focus on the technical and financial aspects of the system, as required by the BRIS Directive.

#### General objective:

# Promoting our European way of life

Cross-border cooperation in civil and criminal matters in the EU is an activity undertaken by various justice professionals and performed on multiple layers contributing to the EU's Area of Security and Justice.

### Specific objective 1. Improved cross-border cooperation in civil and criminal matters

In the field of judicial cooperation in civil and commercial matters, the objective is to conclude the trilogues on the **proposed regulation on the law applicable to the third-party effects of assignment of claims**. In 2022, DG JUST will also continue the work on the new initiatives on **harmonising certain aspects of substantive law on insolvency proceedings** (legislative or non-legislative) and on **recognition of parenthood** between Member States, with the adoption of both Commission proposals expected in Q3 2022. These initiatives will be accompanied by an impact assessment. The insolvency initiative also contributes to the headline ambition "An economy that works for people", while recognition of parenthood initiative – to "A new push for European Democracy".

Preparations on the new **initiative on the protection of vulnerable adults** in cross-border situations will be pursued in 2022, including work on the impact assessment. A public consultation will be launched. This initiative will also contribute to "A new push for European Democracy" headline ambition.

DG JUST will carry on with the **review of existing instruments** in the field of **civil justice**, namely the Rome II Regulation, the Maintenance Regulation and the Brussels Ia Regulation.

DG JUST will continue to support the **international negotiations** in the context of the **Hague Conference on Private International Law (HCCH), Uncitral and Unidroit**. Following the adoption of the 2019 worldwide **Hague Judgments Convention**, the Commission proposal for the **Council Decision on the EU accession to the Convention** was adopted in July 2021 and the adoption of the Council Decision can be expected during the first half of 2022.

In addition, Commission implementing regulations on the digitalisation of the revised service of document and taking of evidence regulations (adopted in 2020) as well as on data collection under the 2019 Directive on restructuring and insolvency will be delivered in Q1 2022. DG JUST will also produce an application guide to accompany the entering into force, in August 2022, of the Brussels IIa Recast.

In the area of criminal justice and judicial cooperation in criminal matters, DG JUST will adopt a proposal on the **transfer of criminal proceedings** between Member States, to step up the fight against cross-border crime. There is currently no common legal framework for the transfer of criminal proceedings between EU Member States. The aim of the proposal is to establish common rules facilitating the transfer of criminal proceedings between competent authorities of the Member States, thereby ensuring effectiveness, efficiency and legal certainty, but also taking into account the legitimate interests of suspects, accused persons and victims. The proposal will be based on an impact assessment (due in Q2 2022) and also take into account the results of a public consultation (launched in December 2021). The initiative will also contribute to "A New Push for European Democracy" headline ambition.

DG JUST will also adopt a Commission Recommendation on **pre-trial detention** and **detention conditions** providing minimum standards and codification of relevant case-law. This initiative will also contribute to "A new push for European Democracy" headline ambition.

Moreover, following the evaluation of the **Victims' Rights Directive**, it is likely that DG JUST will propose its revision<sup>13</sup>. The revision could include areas that are singled out by the EU Strategy on victims' rights such as: strengthening victims physical protection by introducing possible minimum standards, including minimum conditions on issuing and modalities of protection measures or improving victims' access to information as well as access to compensation. The revision will also take into account the results of the ongoing evaluation of the Victims' Rights Directive (due in Q1 2022) and the outcome of the upcoming impact assessment (due in Q4 2022). A public consultation is planned to be launched in Q1 2022. This initiative will also contribute to "A New Push for European Democracy" headline ambition.

DG JUST will continue implementing the **European judicial training strategy**<sup>14</sup> that aims to improve the application of EU law, increase the efficiency of justice by promoting training on 'judgecraft' and non-legal knowledge and skills, foster mutual trust in cross-border judicial proceedings and build a common European judicial culture, including of the rule of law. Its actions will tackle new developments and challenges, such as digitalisation and the use of artificial intelligence, initial judicial training serving the rule of law, the further development of the European training Platform<sup>15</sup> and the capacity building of judicial training in the Western Balkans.

The Commission will seek to enhance the capacity of **Eurojust** to exchange information with third countries. In addition, the Commission continues to work on improving the digital

information exchange on cross-border terrorism cases in the European Judicial Counter-Terrorism Register (CTR) at Eurojust.

With the purpose of strengthening the exchange of **criminal records** information between the EU Member States, the Commission aims to adopt the relevant implementing acts referred to in Regulation 2019/816 and Directive 2019/884, and to continue its support to the Member States and eu-LISA in the context of the ECRIS-TCN Advisory Group and the Programme Management Board.

DG JUST has taken the lead on establishing the European Public Prosecutor's Office (EPPO), which became operational on 1 June 2021. By investigating and prosecuting crimes affecting the Union budget, the EPPO protects taxpayers' money and significantly contributes to a safer Europe. In order to ensure that EU funds are duly protected also beyond the Union's borders, the Commission will continue to participate in the Council of Europe's discussions on a new legal instrument to **regulate the cooperation between** the EPPO and the authorities of the States Parties to the 1959 European Convention on Mutual Assistance in Criminal Matters. The Commission will also consider concluding EU level agreements with some priority third countries on the cooperation between their authorities and the EPPO. Such countries will be identified among those where the EU budget is at a high risk of fraud.

DG JUST will continue monitoring the effective **implementation** of Union legislation concerning criminal law and judicial cooperation instruments and take the necessary steps to correct deficiencies, including by launching infringements.

Specific objective 2. **Improved access to justice for citizens and facilitated cross-border cooperation for judicial authorities through better use of digital technologies** 

In her State of the European Union address of 15 September 2021, President von der Leyen defined digital as the "make-or-break issue" for the EU. Digital technologies play a crucial role for improving the efficiency, resilience and accessibility of the EU's justice systems. Similarly, the digital transformation of EU judicial cooperation and employing digital means facilitating access to justice in cross-border cases are two essential elements necessary to modernise the European area of freedom, security and justice. Individuals and businesses deserve to have the possibility to use modern, electronic means of communication in order to exercise their rights or seek remedy as provided by EU law, irrespective of their physical location.

With this in mind, in 2022 DG JUST will work closely with the co-legislators towards the swift adoption of a Regulation, pursuant to the Commission **proposal for the digitalisation of the body of EU civil and criminal judicial cooperation legal instruments**. This initiative seeks to address the urgent need for digitalisation of justice systems and improving access to justice in the context of the COVID-19 crisis. The proposal aims to enable the default use of the digital communication channel between the competent national authorities with the goal of improving the effectiveness and resilience of cross-border judicial cooperation. It furthermore strives to facilitate individuals' and businesses' access to justice.

DG JUST will also work with the co-legislators towards their adoption of the proposal for a Regulation concerning the establishment of a collaboration platform to support the functioning of **Joint Investigation Teams (JITs)**. The general objective of that initiative is to provide technological support to those involved in a JIT in order to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of these cross-border investigations and prosecutions.

Following the adoption of a Regulation on the e-CODEX system for interoperable cross-border electronic data exchange in the justice area, the Commission will work towards the adoption of the therein foreseen implementing act.

## PART 2. Modernising the administration: main outputs for 2022

The Commission is committed to further modernise its way of working. To this end, in 2022 DG JUST will focus on the key outputs in the traditional areas of organisational management, namely human resources management, financial management, fraud risk management, and information management. Digital transformation and sound environmental management are two new areas, where DG JUST set out its targets for modernisation.

The internal control framework<sup>16</sup> supports sound management and decision-making. It notably ensures that risks to the achievement of objectives are taken into account and reduced to acceptable levels through cost-effective controls.

DG JUST has established an **internal control system tailored to its particular characteristics and circumstances**. The effective functioning of the service's internal control system will be assessed on an ongoing basis throughout the year and be subject to a specific annual assessment covering all internal control principles.

#### A. Human resources management

In 2022, DG JUST will pursue the implementation of the human resources priorities set out in the 2020-2024 local HR Strategy, adopted in December 2020. The concrete list of activities (e.g. workshops, welcome sessions etc.) will be set out in a 2022 annual HR Plan ensuring both continuity and consistency with 2021 activities. Staff will be informed with regular news and updates on the Directorate-General's intranet.

Further improving the **alignment of resources with priorities** will be a core element of the HR efforts in 2022, including, for example, through the implementation of a project on **workload indicators**, started in 2021. DG JUST will continue in parallel its efforts to reach out, assist staff in the ongoing transition to a **new flexible working environment**, and so contribute to staff wellbeing and engagement. COVID-19 related circumstances will however still affect the human resources management in 2022 to some extent.

DG JUST remains committed to **gender equality** and contributes to the corporate objectives. It is also pro-actively involved in the review of HR processes to **fight discrimination** (e.g. in recruitment processes) as part of the development of the new corporate HR Strategy.

### B. Sound financial management

DG JUST has an **effective internal control system** and the components and principles are present and functioning well overall. For what the **legality and regularity of transactions** is concerned, it is **ensured through the controls** throughout the operational and financial management of commitments and payments.

Corrective action to **decrease the error rate** in the non-audited population of grants are taken every year. DG JUST will further simplify the eligibility rules where possible as allowed by the new MFF and the new MGA, will ensure a close follow up of the projects with the continuous reporting tool.

To monitor the financial performance, the Budgetary and Financial Monitor report, including all necessary **Key Performance Indicators** (KPIs), will be reviewed in order to fit with the standard financial measurements included in the Financial Performance Scorecard currently under development by DG BUDG. This Monitor provides the necessary key indicators to ensure a sound and efficient management and the follow-up of financial transactions (budget consumption, time-to-register, time-to-pay, quality of the financial files, etc.). Close monitoring of the payments and continous increase of awareness among staff directly involved in the process will be ensured in 2022 to keep the same level of performance.

The achievement of this objective will be mainly supported by the following actions:

- Performance of *ex-ante* financial controls.
- The deployment of an audit strategy for ex post audits. This focuses on risks as in
  previous years but it also aims to complete all the remaining audits simultaneously
  and to ensure equal treatment among selected beneficiaries These activities aim at
  providing assurance on the legality and regularity of the expenditures declared to
  the Commission, while maximising the flexibility and efficiency of audit resources
- The timely application of financial corrections, when needed.

• A regular follow-up of the state of implementation of all outstanding and overdue audit recommendations issued by the IAS and ECA.

Upon a **specific request from DG JUST**, new provisions on respect of EU values are now included in the corporate Commission model grant agreement (Article 14.2 - in force under the 2021-2027 MFF), making this the **first corporate** measure on the respect of EU values, applying across programmes and DGs. Not only beneficiaries **across programmes** are required to "commit to and ensure the respect of basic EU values (such as respect for human dignity, freedom, democracy, equality, the rule of law and human rights, including the rights of minorities)", but also consequences of non-compliance cases are foreseen.

While publishing **calls for proposals** under the CERV and Justice programmes, adherence to EU values is established and clearly announced as an eligibility condition: in order to be eligible for our calls, applicants **must** comply with Article 2 of TEU and Article 21 of EU Charter.

DG JUST will continue its efforts to reach the targets in the tables below. As every year, DG JUST will do the assessment of its internal control system together with the fraud risk assessment in the frame of the annual risk assessment exercise.

**Objective:** The authorising officer by delegation has reasonable assurance that resources have been used in accordance with the principles of sound financial management and that cost-effective controls are in place which give the necessary guarantees concerning the legality and regularity of underlying transactions.

### C. Fraud risk management

DG JUST has developed and implemented its own **anti-fraud strategy** since 2012, on the basis of the methodology provided by OLAF, following the adoption of the previous

The Research, industry, space, energy and transport family has a different threshold for risk at payment.

Commission anti-fraud strategy<sup>18</sup>. It was further updated in April 2018 and again during 2020, setting out an action plan covering the period 2021-2023. The latest update was done taking into account the new Commission anti-fraud strategy<sup>19</sup> and giving also further consideration to the possible new implications of the adoption of the new Multiannual Financial Framework 2021-2027. Afterwards it will be updated and reviewed as appropriate every two to three years. Its implementation will continue to be monitored **twice** a **year** with reporting to management.

To minimise the risk of fraud, as identified following both the fraud risk assessment and the evaluation of the previous anti-fraud strategy and detailed in the updated 2020 antifraud strategy, specific anti-fraud related actions will continue to be carried out by DG JUST during 2022, including:

- increasing fraud awareness among staff members through dedicated training sessions and lunchtime seminars to be organised in collaboration with OLAF and / or DG HR experts;
- discussions at management level on how to further strengthen the culture of trust and zero tolerance to fraud in DG JUST, as well as the professional integrity of its staff members:
- regular attendance of the Fraud Prevention and Detection Network meetings, to optimise cooperation with OLAF.

At the same time, DG JUST will continue to support Member States' transposition and implementation of the so-called PIF Directive concerning fight against fraud<sup>20</sup> (as detailed in the Action point 54 of the new CAFS's Action plan).

### D. Digital transformation and information management

DG JUST will continue in 2022 its drive to **strengthen data governance**, in particular through updating its Data Quality Framework to ensure alignment to the final form of Eurostat's Reference Quality Framework for other statistics (piloted in 2021) and through advancing the implementation of corporate data governance principles for its key data assets.

Knowledge management activities in 2022 will be geared toward supporting knowledge sharing and collaboration in the new flexible working environment. This will be done among others through nurturing a network of 'M365 champions' (set up in autumn 2021), upgrading and monitoring the uptake of collaboration and knowledge sharing features implemented in 2019-21 under its Knowledge Management Strategy.

In 2022 DG JUST will maintain and further develop its IT systems in the areas of civil, commercial and criminal justice, fundamental rights, rule of law, equality, union citizenship and consumer policy. Existing systems and planned new ones will continue to contribute to the achievement of Commission's Digital Strategy principles, in particular on Digital by default, Once Only, User-centric, Cross-border, Data-driven, Interoperability and Security, as they aim at reducing the burden on citizens, increasing efficiency of national and European institutions and bodies, and at their closer cooperation and collaboration in the domains of Justice and Consumers.

In the cybersecurity area, the **security plans revamped** in 2020 and 2021 pursuant to the EC change of methodology in the domain, will be further updated where needed, identifying further cybersecurity related actions. Some of these actions will further address

the protection of sensitive non-classified data with measures such as multiple factor authentication. Staff will continue to be encouraged to attend corporate cybersecurity awareness initiatives, while IT security knowledge and expertise will be maintained and further improved by embedding cybersecurity elements into the IT specific working methods. Upcoming releases of IT systems will benefit from improved EC central security services and compliance benchmarks.

DG JUST will approach in 2022 the final phase of the **migration to Drupal 8** of its remaining Drupal 7 systems. In the process, the User Centricity aspects of the systems and websites will also be improved. The Online Dispute Resolution (ODR) system will be replatformed to the Cloud. In areas like Once Only, Cross border cooperation and Interoperability, DG JUST will make a significant progress: the eEvidence system will be further deployed on more Member States' infrastructures, enabling point-to-point exchange of evidence in the criminal justice proceedings. The Implementing Act on Service of Documents/Taking of Evidence is expected to be adopted early 2022, which will mark the beginning of the implementation of the new IT system to support the underlying Twin Regulations. The eJustice portal will be subject to important improvements in the areas of User Centricity, Once Only, Cross border and Security, which are expected to start in 2022, continuing the adoption of new generation technologies in its technology stack and by implementing new online forms for a further harmonisation and portability of citizens documents' data formats across Member States.

As regards **data protection compliance**, DG JUST will continue to monitor and update the information regarding its processing operations in the Data Protection Management System (DPMS) throughout 2022. In terms of **awareness raising**, DG JUST will organise activities such as lunchtime seminars, information at unit meetings and include a data protection module in the introductory training for newcomers. Awareness raising activities will focus on practical issues of relevance to the DG, such as handling data breaches, data subject requests, and organisation of meetings and event. Staff will also be encouraged to participate in the data protection trainings organised by the office of the Data Protection Officer. The objective would be to ensure that 100 DG JUST staff take part in such activities during the year.

### E. Sound environmental management

The European Green Deal is one of the headline ambitions of the Von der Leyen Commission. In its Communication, the Commission committed itself to lead by example also in this field: "The Commission is also keen to reduce its environmental impact as an institution and as an employer. It will present a comprehensive action plan in 2020 to implement itself the objectives of the Green Deal and to become climate neutral by 2030". Through EMAS - The Eco-Management and Audit Scheme - the Commission wishes to "lead by example" through the reduction of the direct environmental impact of its own activities. DG JUST aims to contribute to that objective through the following actions in 2022:

- digital transformation as an enabler of more a more sustainable workplace. Drawing
  on the experience from the Covid-19 crisis, increased use of distance
  communication and teleworking tools would reduce the need for transport to and
  from meeting points, and thus reduce the carbon footprint of the DG;
- provide for VC equipment in meeting rooms in order to make remote participation possible;
- regarding missions, assess in each case whether physical presence is really needed, or whether an online meeting could be possible instead;
- encourage staff to use their digital devices rather than print documents for meetings;
- encourage staff to turn off their computers at the end of the working day and to take the stairs, in order to reduce electricity consumption.

**Objective:** DG JUST takes account of its environmental impact in their actions and actively promotes measures to reduce the related day-to-day impact of the administration and its work, with the support their respective EMAS Correspondents/EMAS Site Coordinators.

## F. Initiatives to improve economy and efficiency of financial and nonfinancial activities

Following the recommendation of the *ex-post* evaluation of the Justice and the REC programmes, DG JUST develops a robust monitoring framework that systematically collects information on achieved outputs and results and allow for a better assessment of the performances, effectiveness and efficiency of the programmes.

About 1-2 weeks before finalising the call evaluation, when the draft call ranking is available, DG JUST now also triggers (via REA) the Legal entity and bank account validation, and the automatic financial capacity assessment for entities involved in successful proposals. This gives DG JUST a time advantage by reducing the overall time to inform applicants.

For projects with a positive evaluation which were invited for grant preparation, at the

Officer and the consortium prepare the grant agreement together in the system. In the past, DG JUST allocated 3 weeks to this initial step, whereas now it has been reduced to 2 weeks, which is still sufficient time and gives the opportunity to reduce accordingly the Time-to-grant.
