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GENERAL ASSESSMENT OF CRITERION 4		<p>The offer indicates that children and spouses of EMA staff have access to health care in Sweden and the existence of medical facilities in Stockholm, without indicating access to social security.</p> <p>The offer provides general information on job opportunities in Sweden in a wide range of private and public sectors, in particular in the knowledge-intensive industry.</p>
5) Business continuity <i>This criterion is relevant given the critical nature of the services provided by the Agencies and the need therefore to ensure continued functionality at the existing high level. The criterion relates to the timeframe required to fulfil the four criteria above. It concerns amongst other things the ability to allow the Agencies to maintain and attract highly qualified staff from the relevant sectors, notably in case not all current staff should choose to relocate. Furthermore, it concerns the capacity to ensure a smooth transition to the new locations and hence to guarantee the business continuity of the Agencies which should remain operational during the transition.</i>

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5.2 Ability to allow EMA to maintain and attract highly qualified staff from the relevant sectors	<p><i>"Sweden is capable of meeting the EMA's skills needs now and in the future. One of Stockholm's foremost assets is the population's high level of education and a highly qualified workforce. As a result of the major public and private investments in biopharmaceuticals, e.g. [...], a move to Sweden and Stockholm means an injection of regulatory expertise in this field for the EMA. There is significant education provision for regulatory expertise in the Greater Stockholm Region, such as training for pharmacists and dispensers. Training in the production and regulation of biopharmaceuticals is unique. In addition, the expertise and skills of the existing workforce, originating in the fact that two major pharmaceutical companies ... have a long history in Sweden, should also be mentioned. This involves expertise in processes, toxicology, clinical trials and pharmaceutical development in general [...] Stockholm's strength in ICT means that any required increased digitisation of the EMA's work processes will be able to be met. Sweden's proportion of specialists in ICT, measured as a proportion of the workforce is also one of the highest in Europe. Stockholm offers high-quality education in law and economics. This feeds into a good pool of talent for recruitment in these areas too."
