

# 2024 Rule of Law Report - targeted stakeholder consultation

## Introduction

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The annual Rule of Law Report lies at the centre of the Annual Rule of Law Cycle, which acts as a preventive tool, deepening multilateral dialogue and joint awareness of rule of law issues. So far, four editions of the Rule of Law Report have been published in 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023.

The Commission would like to invite stakeholders to provide contributions to the 2024 Rule of Law Report. This survey provides information on the type of information and topics that will be covered in the 2024 Rule of Law Report, in order to allow stakeholders to provide input. More targeted input may be requested at a later stage of preparation of the 2024 Rule of Law Report, including in the context of country visits, or bilateral contacts.

The 2024 Rule of Law Report will continue to deepen the assessment under the existing four pillars, and will also follow-up on the implementation of the recommendations to Member States, that were issued as part of the 2023 Rule of Law Report. The contribution to be provided should include **(1) information on measures taken to implement the recommendations addressed to the Member State in the 2023 Rule of Law report, as well as developments with regard to the points raised in the respective country chapter and (2) any other significant developments since January 2023<sup>[1]</sup> falling under the ‘type of information’ outlined in section II.**

The input should consist of a short summary, if possible in English, covering the areas referred to below. Legislation or other documents may be referenced with a link. Contributions should focus on significant developments since the last Rule of Law Report both as regards the legal framework and its implementation in practice.

[1] Unless the information was already submitted in the input for the previous Rule of Law Reports.

## Type of information

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The topics are structured according to four pillars: I. Justice system; II. Anti-corruption framework; III. Media pluralism; and IV. Other institutional issues related to checks and balances. The replies could include aspects set out below under each pillar. This can include challenges, current work streams, positive developments and best practices:

## A) Legislative developments

- Newly adopted legislation
- Legislative drafts currently discussed in Parliament
- Legislative plans envisaged by the Government

## B) Policy developments

- Implementation of legislation
- Evaluations, impact assessment, surveys
- White papers/strategies/actions plans/consultation processes
- Follow-up to reports/recommendations of Council of Europe bodies or other international organisations
- Important administrative measures
- Generalised practices

## C) Developments related to the judiciary / independent authorities

- Important case law by national courts
- Important decision/opinions from independent bodies/authorities
- State of play on terms, nominations and expired mandates for high-level positions (e.g. Supreme Court, Constitutional Court, Council for the Judiciary, heads of independent authorities included in the scope of the questionnaire[2])

On 31 January, an unidentified person sent an email to Erwan Chartier containing racial slurs and explicit threats of death and physical violence directed to him and the staff of the privately owned weekly newspaper Le Poher, where Chartier works as editor-in-chief.

Recommendation: French authorities should take all steps to thoroughly and independently investigate all threats against journalists.



French journalist Cemil Şanlı receives death threat, accosted outside home

On 2 March, Cemil Şanlı, a broadcast journalist for the privately owned independent news outlet Le Média TV, received a handwritten death threat in the mailbox of his home. Later that day, he filed a criminal complaint with local police in a suburb of Paris reporting the threat as well as an incident about a month before in which two people with their faces covered accosted him outside of his home and insulted him. Şanlı told CPJ that he believed the threats were related to his coverage of Kurdish issues.

Recommendation: French authorities should take all steps to thoroughly and independently investigate all threats against journalists.

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CPJ calls for French authorities to probe suspected sabotage of French journalist Morgan Large's car

On 24 March, Morgan Large, a host for the privately owned Radio Kreiz Breizh and co-founder of local investigative website Splann!, learned that the lug nuts on the left rear wheel of her car had been loosened to the degree that it endangered the car's stability and put her at risk of an accident. Large told CPJ that she believes this was intentional sabotage, and she was targeted for her investigative reporting on local issues, including agribusiness and environmental damages caused by local farming.

Recommendation: French authorities should take all steps to thoroughly and independently investigate all threats against journalists.

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French police beat, obstruct journalists covering pension protests

Demonstrations broke out throughout France on 16 March, after the government raised the retirement age by two years. Over the ensuing weeks of protests, police officers attacked, harassed, or detained multiple journalists.

Recommendation: The French authorities should guarantee journalists can report freely on issues of public interest, and should refrain from undue harassment of legitimate reporting.

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French reporter Toufik-de-Planoise charged over protest coverage

On 26 April, police summoned Toufik de-Planoise, a reporter with the privately owned local outlets Média 25 and Radio Bip, to a police station in Besançon for questioning, and then detained him for nine hours and charged him with obstructing freedom of assembly and the movement of trains. The charges related to de-Planoise's coverage of a January 30 protest that disrupted an anti-abortion conference and an April 20 demonstration protesting pension reform, during which protesters occupied a train station for at least an hour.

Recommendation: French authorities should refrain from legal retaliation against journalists for their legitimate work.

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Police and protesters attack, obstruct at least 18 journalists covering French protests

On 13 July, CPJ reported multiple attacks on journalists covering the nationwide demonstrations and riots that swept France.

Recommendation: French authorities should investigate all attacks on journalists, including those which allegedly involve police, and see through all necessary protection measures for journalists working in demonstrations or protests.

French intelligence agents search home, detain journalist Ariane Lavrilleux over leaks investigation

On 19 September, police officers with the General Directorate for Internal Security, accompanied by an investigating judge, arrived at Ariane Lavrilleux's home in Marseille, searched the property for 10 hours, and arrested her.

Recommendation: The French authorities should guarantee journalists can report freely on national defense and security issues, that are of public interest, and should refrain from undue harassment of legitimate reporting.
